What was your first job?

After more than ten years in the hotel industry, the opportunity arose to work at Island Harbour for the company that built the initial waterside properties. That was really interesting and included anything from operating the lock, learning to sail, meeting planners and travelling around various cities.

It's always rewarding when we receive thanks and compliments from satisfied customers. The workload running a business can at times, seem overwhelming with scary time restraints, everything from HR to PR, learning the latest technology and prioritising schedules, but all of this goes back to the team, you need all those cogs in the wheel, each responsible for their own areas, then, mostly, it all comes together.

What have you learned about yourself?

Traditionally the security sector is a very male dominated industry, women are not seen as front-runners, and being 'old school' I used to easily accept this.
